KEYNOTE SPEAKER JOHN A. HOWE, DVM, CERTAQV



Dr. John Howe is the immediate past president of the American Veterinary Medical Association (AVMA), having served in the role of President for 2019-2020. His work with the association also included serving as vice chair of the AVMA Council on Veterinary Services and vice chair of the Governance Performance Review Committee, after which he was elected to the Board of Directors from 2012-2018.

A 1977 graduate from the University of Minnesota's College of Veterinary Medicine, Dr. Howe started

a solo mixed-animal practice in North Branch, Minnesota, just after graduation. Seven years later, he joined a six-doctor animal practice where he treated a range of small animals as well as birds and exotics.

His accolades include having earned the Minnesota Veterinary Medical Association (MVMA) Veterinarian of the Year Award in 2011 and the MVMA Distinguished Veterinary Service Award in 2015. Dr. Howe also served two governor-appointed terms on the Minnesota Board of Animal Health, and he was also appointed executive board member and vice president of the MVMA, for which he served as president in 2007.

A 2005 graduate of St. George's University, Dr. Carolina Medina works at Coral Springs Animal Hospital in Florida, focusing on pain management, acupuncture, rehabilitation, and sports medicine. She also lectures nationally and internationally about pain management, osteoarthritis, acupuncture, and rehabilitation therapy.

Shortly after graduating from SGU, Dr. Medina became certified in veterinary acupuncture, Chinese herbal medicine, Tui-na massage, and food therapy by the Chi Institute. Additionally, she completed an

internship in acupuncture at the University of Florida. During that time, she became a founder of both the American Association of Traditional Chinese Veterinary Medicine, as well as the American Journal of Traditional Chinese Veterinary Medicine, where she has been an Associate Editor since its inception.

In 2010, Dr. Medina became certified in canine rehabilitation therapy through the Canine Rehabilitation Institute, and in 2013, she became a Diplomate of the American College of Veterinary Sports Medicine and Rehabilitation. Dr. Medina held the position of clinical assistant professor and chief of integrative medicine at the University of Florida from 2008–2013.

She served on the Board of Directors for the International Veterinary Academy of Pain Management from 2011–2015 as well as the Board of the American Association of Rehabilitation Veterinarians from 2012–2017. She currently serves on the Board of St. George's University Florida Chapter Alumni Association as the Treasurer. Dr. Medina also became a certified veterinary pain practitioner through the International Veterinary Academy of Pain Management in 2019.
