KEYNOTE SPEAKER

M. DANIEL GIVENS, DVM, PhD, DACVM, DACT

Dr. M. Daniel Givens is dean of Virginia-Maryland College of Veterinary Medicine at Virginia Tech. His nearly three-decade veterinary career spans both academia and clinical medicine as a livestock and small animal veterinary medicine practitioner in Campbellsville, KY. In his many roles, he aims to strengthen the college's One Health approach to solving complex health problems.

A diplomate of both the American College of Veterinary Microbiologists and the American College of Theriogenologists, Dr. Givens has conducted critical research on infectious diseases affecting cattle reproduction. This work resulted in the diagnosis of uniquely localized viral infections and assisted in the prevention of viral transmission.

Dr. Givens recently served on the American Veterinary Medical Association (AVMA) Council on Education (COE) Strategic Planning Steering Committee and currently serves as an accreditation site visitor for the AVMA COE. He is also a member of the American Association for the Advancement of Science and the Virginia Academy of Science, Engineering, and Medicine.

Before becoming the school's dean, his roles at Virginia Tech included faculty member, director of an agricultural experiment station, acting department head, and associate dean for academic affairs.

Dr. Givens completed his residency, a PhD in biomedical science, and his National Institutes of Health (NIH)-funded postdoctoral research at Auburn University.

Dr. Francesca Ivaldi has extensive ties to St.
George's University School of Veterinary
Medicine. After earning her Doctor of
Veterinary Medicine from SGU in 2006,

As an associate professor in SVM's
Department of Small Animal Medicine and
Surgery, Dr. Ivaldi teaches didactic and clinical
courses. She has developed multiple simulated

models and material to improve students' acquisition of small animal physical examination and clinical skills.

Dr. Ivaldi has been the coordinator of the surgery and dentistry services within SVM's Small Animal Clinic since 2012—having a strong interest in soft tissue and orthopedics in the respective fields.

Knowing what it is like to be a veterinary medical student at SGU, Dr. Ivaldi serves as a mentor to her students. She is faculty advisor to the student chapter of the SGU SVM Alumni Association and the student chapter of the Foundation for Veterinary Dentistry while also being closely involved with the Feral Cat Project and the Surgery Club.

Dr. Ivaldi is a member of the AOVet Foundation and the Foundation for Veterinary Dentistry and has obtained her Fear Free Certification. As an SVM alumna, she served on the board of the SGU SVM Alumni Association from 2010 to 2018 in the roles of president and vice president.

Dr. Ivaldi earned a bachelor's degree in biology from the University of Michigan, and master's degree in basic medical science from Wayne State University.
